FIRST READING 1 KINGS 17:10-16

What a dreadful situation
this poor widow is in. She is
gathering wood for the fire
to cook the last meal she
can provide for herself and
her son. They have nothing
left and she sees no future
for them. Yet, when the

prophet Elijah asks her for
food, she shares what she
has. Elijah knows that God
will look after them, even
though there seems no way
out. All they need to do is
trust in God – and everyone
has all they need!

Jesus made one huge
sacrifice, when he gave
up his life. Now no one
needs to worry about any
other sacrifices. Everyone
can enjoy life with God.
All we need to do is to
trust Jesus.

DO YOU KNOW?

A **widow** is someone
whose **husband has**
died. Although all
widows need support,
in Jesus' time life was
even harder for widows
than today. Without a
husband to go to work,
widows usually had very
little money to feed
their families. We learn
from the two widows in
today's readings that
even when life is hard,
we can all **trust in God**.



THINK

We might feel small and
unimportant, but we
can all be **generous**.
Each of us can **give our**
time and love to other
people. Even if no one
else notices, Jesus will!



GOSPEL MARK 12:38-44

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Mark.

Even in Jesus' time people were interested in wearing fashionable clothes and looking important. Just like today, there were those who treated other people badly, while making a show of appearing to be good. Jesus contrasts their behaviour with a poor widow going to the Temple. She gives

everything she has to God, trusting that God will look after her. The poor widow does not pretend to be anything she is not. She is nothing like the rich men who are only concerned with image. External success is not important – a loving and generous heart is what matters.

FIRST READING DANIEL 12:1-3

Belief in God doesn't mean an easy life. The prophet Daniel knows that there will be hard times ahead but he also gives us hope that everything will work out well in the end. God has sent the angel Michael to help and guard us. Good people, who have tried to do what is right will "shine brightly". God is fair and just. God will make sure that the people who have lived well, trying to follow God's ways, will be rewarded.

Preserve me, God, I take refuge in you.

SECOND READING HEBREWS 10:11-14, 18

We can try and try again to put everything right with God, but without Jesus it just can't be done. People used to try making sacrifices in the hope that God would forgive their sins. Although it is important that we do try to put things right with God, this letter is reminding us that Jesus has sorted everything out for us. All we need to do is to trust Jesus and let him be in charge of our lives.

DO YOU KNOW?

Pope Francis asks us all to think about and pray for anyone in the world who is poor. Today is set aside as World Day of the Poor. Pope Francis knows that if we say we love God, we must give practical help and support to all the people in God's family, wherever they are.



THINK

Jesus calls himself the "Son of Man" in the Gospel. This title has different meanings, but here it links to the first reading from Daniel. The son of man will bring God's glory at the end of time by bringing about God's kingdom. We can all help to make God's kingdom real by living as God asks, loving others and treating people fairly.



GOSPEL MARK 13:24-32

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Mark.

No matter how difficult life gets, God will be with us. Jesus comforts us today with the reminder that his words will never pass away. He warns us to be ready for his coming, not because he wants us to be frightened, but because he wants us to

be confident that he loves us and is coming to be with us. The more we are alert and watching out for Jesus, the more aware we will be of his love in our lives. The buds on a fig tree tell us that summer is on the way and, just as certainly, Jesus is near.

STAND to LISTEN

to the priest or deacon as he prepares to read the Gospel.

Before he reads the Gospel, what does he do to his forehead, his lips and his heart? Can you copy him?



PRAY

"...but my words will not pass away."

Take a moment to be quiet and still. Close your eyes and enjoy sitting with Jesus. Know that Jesus is always with you, loving you. Listen to him.

FIRST READING DANIEL 7:13-14

The Jewish people were living in difficult and dangerous times. King Antiochus Epiphanes had captured Jerusalem was forcing the people to give up their faith and worship other gods. The prophet Daniel uses a symbolic

vision to explain that God will overcome all the earthly problems that they face. The son of man will come on the clouds of heaven. God is a king like no other. When God comes in power to rule on earth, his reign will never end.

We say these words or sing a hymn as the priest approaches the altar.

We ask for God's help. Listen now to the priest as he offers this prayer.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. The prophet Daniel gives a message of hope to the suffering people of God.

The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PSALM 92

The Lord is King, with majesty enrobed.



SECOND READING APOCALYPSE 1:5-8

As the Jews were suffering a time of persecution in the first reading, it is the Christians who are suffering when this book is written. It begins with a hymn of praise to Jesus, king of all kings who loves each

one of us. Jesus is the son of man who Daniel prophesied coming on the clouds of heaven in our first reading. For Christians, it is Jesus who is our hope and king, who makes God's power real in the world.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. By sacrificing himself Jesus has put everything right for us with God.

We give a shout of praise to God, using these words taken from the Bible.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia!
Blessings on him who comes in the name of the Lord!
Blessings on the coming kingdom of our father David!
Alleluia!



DO YOU KNOW?

Our first and second readings are from **apocalyptic books**. The word "apocalypse" comes from a Greek word which means an "uncovering" or a "revelation". In fact, the **book of the Apocalypse** is also known as the **book of Revelation**. Both Daniel and Apocalypse were written for people who were **suffering for their faith**. They are **full of hope**, looking forward to the time when **God will overcome** all suffering.



THINK

If we say Jesus is our king, we are saying that we follow Jesus' rules. What do you think are Jesus' rules? If we all make Jesus our king and live as he asks, together we could make the world a much better place.



GOSPEL JOHN 18:33-37

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St John.

Jesus is on trial for his life. He has been brought to Pilate, the Roman governor who has the authority to sentence Jesus to death. Yet Jesus is shown as being confident and the one who is really in charge. Jesus has just the right words to say. He explains that he could

have asked his followers to fight for him, like any other king might have done. But Jesus is not like any other king. Jesus' kingdom is not like any other kingdom. Jesus was born for this, the time when he shows that love is the power that will overcome all evil.



STAND to LISTEN

to the priest or deacon as he prepares to read the Gospel.

Before he reads the Gospel, what does he do to his forehead, his lips and his heart? Can you copy him?



PRAY

"It is you who say it."

Take a moment to sit quietly with Jesus. Ask Jesus to help you to really know and understand him. Ask him to be king of your heart. Amen.

FIRST READING JEREMIAH 33:14-16

As the prophet Jeremiah writes this passage, he is in jail. In fact, things are looking pretty bad for the whole of Israel; neighbouring armies are invading the country. Yet Jeremiah has absolute confidence in God's promise. There will be a

good and positive future for God's people. A saviour from the family of King David will come and rescue Israel. This messiah will bring everyone back to God's ways of honesty and justice. Today we know that Jesus is God's promise come true!

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. The prophet Jeremiah gives a vision of hope to the people of Israel.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM PSALM 24

To you, O Lord, I lift up my soul.

The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.



SECOND READING 1 THESSALONIANS 3:12 - 4:2

Paul supports the Christian communities around the world with his letters. Here he is giving the best help and advice he can to the people in Thessalonica as they try to follow Jesus. In the first place, Paul prays

for his friends. Then, he reminds them how to live as Jesus taught us. The same advice will help us too: it is by only by loving God and each other that we will live the kind of life we were meant to live.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. Love is the way that we will follow Jesus and live the life we are called to.

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St Luke.

Jesus wants his friends to have hope and be confident. He knows that the world can be a frightening place at times. Disasters will happen and things that we can't influence will make us anxious. But we can trust that God has everything under

control. We can stand tall and hold our heads high, because we know that God is with us. Jesus wants us to make sure we keep on praying. Prayer is our link to the love that God has for us and the strength we will need. If we are alert, we will see God is with us always.
