FIRST READING ACTS 5:27-32. 40-41

Respecting authority is very important. However, sometimes it is even more important to do what is right. Today we hear how the apostles are warned by the people in charge not to keep on talking about Jesus. They are worried that

the apostles are causing trouble, blaming them for Jesus' death. Peter and the apostles know that it is far more important to do what God asks. They continue to spread the good news about Jesus – and even feel happy to have suffered for Jesus.

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN.

The apostles continue to tell everyone about Jesus, despite official warnings.

The cantor or psalmist sings or says the psalm. Listen to the verses, and then respond by using these words.

SECOND READING APOCALYPSE 5:11-14

All of creation is praising Jesus in John's vision of heaven. Angels, people and even animals are gathered round the throne and are worshipping God. All of John's visions are written in code, as the first

Christians were in trouble with the authorities. Jesus is "the Lamb" who has sacrificed himself to show us all just how much God loves us. Let us all join in with the thanks and praise to God!

LOOK at the reader and LISTEN.

DO YOU KNOW?

Tuesday 3 May is the feast of Ss Philip and James, Apostles. We don't know much about these men, but both were chosen by Jesus to spread the message of God's love. Each one of us, even if no one ever knows much about us, is very precious to God and each one of us has an important job to do.

GOSPEL JOHN 21:1-19

The Good News about Jesus is told to us by St John.

The disciples have been fishing but caught nothing. When a man on the shore points out where to find fish and they are overloaded, they realise it is Jesus! In his excitement, Peter jumps into the water and wades to the shore. Jesus has prepared a fire and they

sit down to a breakfast of fresh fish and bread. After eating, Peter is shown that he is forgiven for failing to stand up for Jesus when he was on trial. The three times Jesus invites Peter to say he loves him, cancelling out the three times Peter denied knowing Jesus.



Jesus' audience knows all about shepherds, so Jesus uses this analogy to explain just how much he cares for us. Jesus says that we are his sheep and he knows each one of us individually. We listen to Jesus and follow him. Jesus gives us eternal life and will keep us all safe. No one can ever take us from Jesus.

imagery which will help his readers understand. The twelve tribes of Israel are referenced, but this new Jerusalem will be so much more special than anything anyone has known before. Heaven will be lit with the glory of God. LOOK at the reader and LISTEN. God makes all creation new!
